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ABSTRACT:

This document serves as a guiding philosophy as well as practical guide for creating a parks and recreation system capable of meeting the current needs of the City of Perryville’s residents while leading the way towards a better quality of life for future generations and spurring economic development. The Plan assesses the physical attributes of the City and the needs and desires of the residents, and establishes goals, policies, and specific actions for developing a cohesive and interconnected system of beautification areas, neighborhood and community parks, greenways, and natural areas in which the community can take pride.

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
1 Introduction

1.1 Overview

This document serves as a guiding philosophy as well as practical guide for creating a parks and recreation system capable of meeting the current needs of the City of Perryville’s residents while leading the way towards a better quality of life for future generations and spurring economic development. The Plan assesses the physical attributes of the City and the needs and desires of the residents, and establishes goals, policies, and specific actions for developing a cohesive and interconnected system of beautification areas, neighborhood and community parks, greenways, and natural areas in which the community can take pride. Figure 1.1: Existing Recreational Opportunities gives an overview of the parks and recreational facilities in the city.

Perryville’s population has grown steadily over the past 150 years and has added just over 3,000 people between 1970 and 2010, representing an average decade-over-decade growth of 15%. Although this rate has slowed to closer to 8% in recent decades, the City of Perryville continues to experience a sustainable rate of growth in its population, which the SEMO Regional Planning Commission (SEMO RPC) projects to continue into the future. The City is projected to have a 2020 population of approximately 8,855 people, up from 8,225 in 2010. This growth in population will continue to push the need for a growing Parks & Recreation system if the City is to meet the needs and desires of its residents. It is the purpose of this plan to help the City plan for this growth of the Parks & Recreation system and make the most efficient use of its resources.

1.2 Purpose

This planning document has several purposes, including to:

- Identify and prioritize parks, recreation, and open space needs, enabling the City to focus development efforts;
- Evaluate the state of the parks & recreation services in Perryville, thereby identifying parks and services that are fulfilling their purpose, those that need improvements, and those that should be removed in order to allow the City to focus resources elsewhere;
- Coordinate, where appropriate, provision of parks & recreation resources with non-City entities, such as Perry County, the various school districts, local non-profits, and private recreation providers;
- Provide a means for citizens and interest groups to participate in parks & recreation planning;
- Educate the public and citizen boards on the importance of parks and recreation;
- Identify areas of the City parks system where citizens can help through volunteer work;
- Provide a Vision and Goals for park development and maintenance for citizens, Aldermen, and other commissions and staff; and
- Identify methods to ensure adequate, long-range funding for parks acquisition, development, and maintenance.

1.3 Process

Plan development began in early October, 2015 with the City contracting with the SEMO RPC to develop a Parks & Recreation Master Plan. Over the next few months, the SEMO RPC conducted inventories and analyses of the existing parks in the City's Parks & Recreation system, and also included Legion Lake Park, which is County owned, the Perry Park Center, which is County owned but maintained by the City, and the Perry County Community Lake which is owned by the State of Missouri.

Public engagement was a critical priority in the development of this plan. For a plan to be realistic and viable it must reflect the values, needs, and desires of the public. To engage the public and solicit input on the needs and desires of the community, the SEMO RPC and the City's Parks & Recreation Department conducted multiple focus group meetings with community members representing groups with interests in softball/baseball, soccer, and swimming. Staff also met with senior citizens, representatives from the public and private schools, and conducted an open house meeting at the Perry Park Center. Finally, the RPC and City staff developed an online survey that was made available to the entire community and promoted it through word-

of-mouth, email blasts, social media, local radio interviews, and newspaper articles. This public input was instrumental in the development of the Vision, Goals, and Actions set forth in this plan.

1.4 Scope

This plan is intended to serve as a long-range guide for the development of the City's Parks & Recreation system, with a planning horizon of 20 years. As such, the actions in this plan are broad in scope, calling, for example, for the development of a splash pad and/or outdoor pool, though not detailing precisely where such a facility should be located, nor exactly what type of amenities should be included.

This plan has been developed with the intention that it will be updated on a regular schedule, ideally every 4 to 5 years, to account for changes in the demographics, development, values, needs, and desires of the community. Therefore, recommendations in this plan should not be viewed as unchanging for the next 20 years, but rather as a response to the community's currently expressed needs and desires.

2 Perryville Community & Parks System Overview

2.1 Overview

The following section provides an overview of Perryville-its history, development patterns, natural characteristics and current population statistics. Perryville's recreational system, including types and facilities, non-governmental opportunities, finance, and surrounding recreational opportunities are also included in this overview.

2.2 Community Overview

The City of Perryville was originally incorporated as a village in 1831, though this incorporation was allowed to lapse, resulting in the incorporation of the town a second time in 1856. In 1882 the town became a fourth class city, which it remains to this day although it has been eligible for third class status for some years.

Perryville is the County Seat of Perry County and is the largest city in the county. It is located approximately 12 miles from the Mississippi River in a highly Karst area of the County. The City and immediately surrounding area is characterized by gently rolling hills and fertile farm land. Cinque Hommes creek runs through southern portions of the City while Saline Creek to the west of the City serves as the City's water source.


Perryville is located on Interstate 55, approximately 35 miles north of the City of Cape Girardeau and approximately 80 miles south of downtown St. Louis. Perryville has a very strong manufacturing base, with TG Missouri and Gilster-Mary Lee employing thousands, and a strong agricultural component to its economic base thanks to the large areas of farmland in the surround area.

2.2.1 Natural Environment

2.2.1.1 Rivers & Creeks

Given the Karst topography of Perryville, surface drainage systems such as creeks and streams are not as common as would be expected in an area characterized by rolling hills. Figure 2.1: Environmental Features, shows the location of sinkholes, flood plains, and forest cover in and around the City. Much of the surface water of the city drains into one of the numerous sinkholes throughout the City and into the cave system below ground. The two main creeks in and near the City of Perryville are Cinque Hommes Creek to the south and the South Branch of Saline Creek to the West. The later serves as the City's water source, while the City's treated wastewater is released into the former.

2.2.1.2 Topography

The Karst topography of eastern Perry County and Perryville itself gives the City a scenic landscape and is responsible for many of the prominent topographic and geological features of the City and surrounding area. Karst topography is created by the dissolving of sedimentary rock, such as limestone, by groundwater. Karst terrain is characterized by springs, caves, sinkholes, and highly productive aquifers. As shown in




Figure 2.2: Karst Topography, Perryville is located in the Ozark Plateau Aquifers, which cover most of the southern half of Missouri and parts of Illinois, Arkansas, and Oklahoma¹.

2.2.1.3 Flora & Fauna

The vegetation of the Perryville area has changed over the centuries due to immigration and farming. Originally much of the area was under forest-cover; however, now most of the surrounding area is utilized for pasture or row crops. Common vegetation found throughout the city includes Hickory, Maples, Oaks, Cedar, Cypress, and Pine.

Perryville is also the habitat for many animals typical of the wider region, such as raccoons, opossums, deer, etc. The most noteworthy creature in Perryville is one that is almost never seen: the Grotto Sculpin. This small fish, found only in the cave streams of Perry County, was listed as Endangered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in September of 2013. As this fish's habitat is directly affected by groundwater runoff moving into sinkholes, and as all of Perryville's parks have sinkholes within them, the parks system serves as an important tool in protecting this endangered species.

2.2.2 Built Environment

2.2.2.1 Crossings


The City is split mainly by man-made structures, primarily Interstate 55, MO 51, and US 61. These highways represent significant barriers to pedestrians, with few pedestrian-friendly crossing along their routes. Only a small section of the City lies to the west of I-55, though this area includes the Perry County Community Lake. All other parks are located within the area generally bound by MO 51 and US 61, making pedestrian travel to and from these parks relatively easy for most residents.

2.2.3 Demographics

2.2.3.1 Population Growth

As of the 2010 U.S. Census, there were 8,225 residents in the City of Perryville, up from 7,667 in 2000. Table 2.1: Population History, shows the population growth of the City since 1860. This growth is expected to continue, with the SEMO RPC projecting a 2020 population for the City of 8,855. Figure 2.4: General Residential Structure Age, shows the age of single and double family housing structures in the City, illustrating the general growth areas of the City.




Much of the growth of the past 20 years has been scattered around the periphery of the City. This makes identifying future growth areas difficult, though a significant amount is likely to occur in and around areas that have seen recent growth, specifically the four subdivisions highlighted on the map. The majority of development has been single-

family homes, which is expected to continue, although there may be an emerging demand for multi-family housing in the City².

2.2.3.2 Age of Residents

Youth and senior citizens are two large user-groups of parks, open space, and recreational facilities. In 2010, residents under 18 years old accounted for just over 25% of the City's population, a growth of 1% from 2000. This is more or less in line with the State of Missouri, for which resident's under 18 made up 24% in 2010. As for senior citizens, residents 65 and older represented 18% of the City's population, compared to only 14% for the State. For the City, this represented a decrease of 1.5% from 2000. These figures indicate a general stability in the composition of ages of residents in the City, and these percentages are expected to generally continue in the future, though with a possible increase in the percentage of senior citizens.

2.2.3.3 Recreation Participation

According to the Outdoor Foundation's 2015 Outdoor Recreation Participation Report, nearly 50% of all Americans engaged in at least one outdoor activity (not including ball-and-stick sports such as soccer, baseball, golf, etc.) in 2014³. This participation rate has remained steady since the report began in 2006, with a range between 48.4% (2014) and 50.0% (2007).


2.3 Parks & Recreation System Overview

The City of Perryville owns approximately 145 acres of parklands and facilities and also maintains the Perry Park Center, a County owned facility. Also within the City is the Perry County Community Lake, which is owned and maintained by the Missouri Department of Conservation. There is also a semi-public 9-hole golf course in the City, along with a walking/natural area on the grounds of the Seminary.

The public parks within the City are broken into three types: neighborhood parks, community parks, and natural resource areas. The City also has a bike trail marked along certain city streets connecting The Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex to the City Park and Perry Park Center. Figure 2.5: City Owned Recreation Facilities, shows all parklands and recreational buildings owned by the City, while Figure 2.6: Existing Recreational Opportunities, shows all recreational opportunities within the City, both public and private.

2.3.1 Types of Parks Found in Perryville

The following section details the types of parks found in Perryville and gives examples for each identified type. National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) standards are referenced to provide a method of comparing Perryville’s parks with those in similar sized cities around the country. Table 2.2: Publicly Owned Parkland, provides an overview of the publicly owned parks within the City.

2.3.1.1 Neighborhood Parks

Neighborhood parks serve as the recreational focus of a neighborhood. The average size of Perryville’s neighborhood parks is 4.5 acres while the City has approximately 2.7 acres of neighborhood parks per 1,000 residents, more than double the NRPA’s standard of 1.0 acre per 1,000 residents.

2.3.1.2 Community Parks

Community parks should be able to meet the recreation needs of the entire community. Perryville has three such facilities: City Park, the Perry Park Center, and The Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex. The two parklands total nearly 125 acres of ground, working out to 15 acres per 1,000 people. The NRPA standards call for a minimum of 100 acres for this type of park and 2.5 acres per 1,000 people. While the City Park does not quite meet the minimum suggested acreage, for a city of its size, Perryville has an impressive amount of community park space of 7 times the national standard.

2.3.1.3 Natural Resource Areas

Natural resource areas are lands set aside for the preservation of significant natural resources, open space, and visual aesthetics. There are no current national standards for this type of park. The City of Perryville has nearly 370 acres of natural resource area, an average of 184 acres per park, while providing 44.5 acres per 1,000 residents.

2.3.1.4 Greenways

Greenways preserve human, wildlife, and water corridors, linking portions of the community together. There are no national standards for greenways other than a generally accepted minimum width of 50 ft. and an optimal width of 200+ ft.


For many communities, rivers, creeks, and streams provide excellent opportunities to develop greenways and trails throughout their areas. However, because of the Karst topography, streams and water corridors in the City of Perryville tend to be underground, providing fewer naturally occurring areas for greenway/trail development. At this time, there are no greenways in the City.

2.3.2 Current Funding Systems

The City of Perryville General Fund currently finances the maintenance, labor, supplies, and development of the City's Parks & Recreation system. The General Fund also covers other essential city services such as the Police department and maintenance of streets. Similar to most communities across the nation, there is less money available in the general fund than there is demand.

Parkland acquisition is irregular, as the City does not have a large fund reserved for park acquisition and development. The City is often reliant on land donations and grants to conduct significant development or growth of the parks system. Figure 2.7: City Owned Property, shows parcels currently owned by the City; however, many of these parcels are either already a part of the park system, or are developed with other City services, such as City Hall, water treatment facilities, or the police station.

2.3.3 Non-governmental Opportunities

The City of Perryville has a history of working with other entities outside the public sphere. One of the most prominent examples of this is The Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex, which was developed almost entirely through the donations and generosity of the Optimists Club. Maintenance of the park continues to be a partnership, with the City handling the general maintenance, such as mowing and striping, while the Optimists and private donations help maintain the turf, goals, and netting.

The baseball/softball fields at City Park are also examples of public-private partnerships. Veterans' Field was renovated through donations from the American Legion while other fields have been renovated and improved through private donations and the recent formation of a field improvement committee, which is funded by selling naming rights to the ball fields.

Another example of partnerships with other entities includes local schools' use of City facilities such as the soccer complex, city pool, and theater for events and activities. In fact, expanded partnerships with the public and private schools in Perryville represent one of the greatest opportunities for the City to expand the number of programs offered while avoiding the cost of building additional facilities. See Section 6: Action Recommendations for further discussion on these opportunities.

2.3.4 Surrounding Recreational Opportunities

Residents of Perryville have numerous recreational opportunities within a short drive of home. Just 15 miles north of Perryville on County Road 916 is Ball Mill Resurgence, another feature of Karst topography. During heavy rains, the sinkhole basin at Ball Mill fills rapidly with stormwater. Once the basin is full, the water “surges” out of the sinkhole in a spring-like fashion and flows down into Blue Spring Branch just a short distance away. This conservation area is owned by the L-A-D Foundation and is open to the public.

Within just 50 miles of Perryville there are multiple State Parks with camping, fishing, hiking, hunting, and canoeing, along with equestrian and ATV trails. Also within this area are multiple historic sites and areas, as well as privately owned and operated recreational opportunities.

Also, Perryville is located only 80 miles south of St. Louis, which offers numerous regional-scale recreational opportunities, such as Major League Baseball and National Hockey League teams, the St. Louis Zoo, the Science Center, the Magic House, and the

Gateway Arch, to name just a few. This proximity to a major metropolitan area and rich natural amenities affords residents convenient access to numerous additional recreational opportunities without sacrificing the small-town qualities that drew them to Perryville.

3 Vision, Goals, and Objectives

3.1 Overview

The vision, goals, and objectives of the City for the Parks & Recreation system are foundational elements for this Plan. Their purpose is to:

- Provide direction for policy development and decision-making to support the Parks & Recreation system to the year 2036, and beyond;
- Identify priorities for ongoing development of the Parks & Recreation system; and,
- Provide benchmarks for implementation and evaluation.

One of the guiding principles for this plan is public participation. As such, the goals and objectives were developed with public involvement throughout the planning process. This was accomplished through multiple avenues, including focus groups, open-house meetings, and public surveys.

A vision, or sometimes mission statement, is an overarching value statement and is typically expressed in an on-going fashion. Goals are broad statements of intent that describe a desired outcome, while objectives are more specific. Objectives should help define when a goal has been met and goals should further the pursuit of the vision. It is expected that these goals and objectives will change over time as the community evolves and goals or objectives are accomplished.

Vision: Support the physical and mental health of residents while supporting the social, cultural, economic, and environmental health of the community.

Goal: Ensure the environmental and financial sustainability and safety of individual facilities and the Parks & Recreation system as a whole.

Goal: Provide a high quality, diversified Parks & Recreation system that provides opportunities for all ages, interests, and abilities.

Goal: Provide a high quality, diversified set of programs and services that provide fun and educational opportunities to all ages, interests, and abilities.

Goal: Preserve, enhance, and protect the natural and cultural environment in and around the City.

Goal: Ensure convenient access to parks, facilities, programs, and services for all residents.

Goal: Develop, staff, train, and support a professional Parks & Recreation Department that effectively serves the community.

Goal: Ensure the environmental and financial sustainability and safety of individual facilities and the Parks & Recreation system as a whole.

Objectives:

- Design and develop facilities that reduce overall facility maintenance and operation requirements and costs.
- Where appropriate, use low maintenance materials, settings, or other value engineering considerations that reduce care and security requirements, and retain natural conditions and experiences.
- Develop a maintenance management system to estimate and plan for life-cycle maintenance and replacement costs.
- Develop and implement safety standards, procedures, and programs that will provide proper training and awareness for department personnel.
- Define and enforce rules and regulation concerning park activities and operations that will protect user groups, personnel and the general public.
- Promote sustainable landscape to increase the ecological functions of natural areas.
- Foster environmental stewardship through education programs and activities.

Goal: Provide a high quality, diversified Parks & Recreation system that provides opportunities for all ages, interests, and abilities.

Objectives:

- Provide a system of quality neighborhood parks that are within walking distance of residents.
- Provide parks with unique activities and amenities for all age groups and abilities, equally distributed throughout the community.
- Expand existing parks as necessary to add capacity and accommodate population growth.
- Work with developers to identify additional park opportunities in developing and redeveloping areas.
- Cooperate with other public and private agencies and with private landowners to set aside land and resources necessary to provide high quality, convenient park and recreation facilities.
- Provide a mix of court and field activities for organized sports (e.g. basketball, tennis, soccer) that provide for a large number of participants.

- Develop new or improved multi-use facilities to increase flexibility of use for new activities as needs change.
- Where appropriate and affordable, incorporate art into parks facilities, such as railings, benches, buildings, displays, and other amenities.
- Provide operation and maintenance to insure safe, serviceable, and functional parks and facilities.
- Where appropriate and affordable, develop and operate specialized facilities to accommodate the specialized interests of the general public.

Goal: Provide a high quality, diversified set of programs and services that provide fun and educational opportunities to all ages, interests, and abilities.

Objectives:

- Train and support park staff to identify and implement programs to address community needs.
- Initiate joint programs with other public and private agencies to provide special activities and programs and compliment existing city programming.
- Provide programs that incorporate arts and crafts, music, video, classroom instruction, and other non-athletic activities.
- Utilize interpretive materials to highlight features such as native flora and fauna, natural features, and historic points of interest.
- Support athletic programs for all ages and abilities.
- Assist with programs and exhibits that document and develop awareness of Perryville’s heritage and history.

Goal: Preserve, enhance, and protect the natural and cultural environment in and around the City.

Objectives:

- Define and preserve a system of open space corridors and buffers to provide separation between natural areas and urban land uses.
- Provide natural area and open space linkages within the developed area of the City.
- Preserve environmentally sensitive areas to serve as natural area linkages, habitat corridors, and urban buffers.
- Preserve culturally significant sites to protect the cultural history of the area and provide opportunities for education.
- Preserve and protect significant environmental features including unique woodlands, meadows, hillsides, and cave openings which support wildlife and reflect Perryville’s natural character.
- Preserve and protect sites that support threatened/endangered species.

- Cooperate with other public and private agencies and with private landowners to set aside and preserve unique environmental and cultural features and areas for public access in future land developments.

Goal: Ensure convenient access to parks, facilities, programs, and services for all residents.

Objectives:

- Design all areas to be accessible to individuals and organized groups of all physical capabilities, skill levels, age groups, and interests.
- Provide ADA accessible gym equipment when possible.
- Implement the provisions and requirements of the American with Disabilities Act (ADA) and other design and development standards that will improve accessibility.
- Provide handicap accessible parking at all parks and facilities.

Goal: Develop, staff, train, and support a professional Parks & Recreation Department that effectively serves the community.

Objectives:

- Encourage teamwork through communications, creativity, positive image, risk taking, sharing of resources, and cooperation toward common goals.
- Where appropriate, provide staff with education, training, and modern equipment and supplies to increase personal productivity, efficiency, and pride.
- Monitor work load and staffing needs to maintain an adequate, efficient work force.

4 Perryville Parks & Recreation System: Inventory and Analysis

4.1 Overview

The City of Perryville has over 500 acres of publicly owned parkland across 9 parks plus the Perry Park Center. These parks are broken up into three categories: neighborhood parks, community parks, and natural resource areas. Not all of the parkland in the City is actually owned or even operated by the City. The Perry Park Center is a County owned, City operated building located in the City owned City Park. Neither of the two natural resource areas, Legion Lake and Perry County Community Park, are owned or operated by the City. Perry County owns and operates Legion Lake, while the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) owns and operates Perry County Community Lake.

The majority of residential property in the City is within a 10 minute walk of a publicly owned park, as illustrated in Figure 4.1: Residential Proximity to Dedicated Parks. Most residential properties outside this walking distance are north of US 61 or west of MO 51, along with a small strip south of the downtown square and a portion of the Windy Heights subdivision.

Figure 4.2: Population Proximity, shows that approximately 60% of the City's entire population is within this ideal 10 minute walking distance. Similarly, 60% of the under-18 population is within a 10 minute walk to a publicly owned park.

Finally, Figure 4.3: Park/School Proximity shows that all school buildings within the City, both public and private, are within a 10 minute walk of a park. While there are areas of residential development outside a 10 minute walk to a park, the City does have very good coverage of both residents and schools. It is also anticipated that as the areas outside a 10 minute walk continue to develop, neighborhood parks will be developed in those areas, providing coverage to residents.

Figure 4.1: Residential Proximity to Dedicated Parks




Figure 4.2: Population Proximity





Figure 4.3: Park/School Proximity



4.2 Existing Parks

4.2.1 Neighborhood Parks

The City of Perryville has five neighborhood parks: Chamber of Commerce Park (commonly known as Feltz Street Park), French Lane Park, Northdale Park, School Street Park, and Viola Blechle Park. These parks range in size from just over one-half acre to just over 8 acres.

Home to the City's skate park and little else. There are remnants of a trail through the park, a few pieces of outdated play equipment, and an unused maintenance shed converted from an outdoor racquetball court. There is also a basketball court adjacent to the skate park and a closed restroom.



This park is known as a problem area to law enforcement and parks staff, and efforts are being made to address these issues. The park has some unusual surrounding land uses:

adjacent to the north is a cemetery, adjacent to the east is an industrial property, with residential on the other two sides. This means that much of the area surrounding the park is empty after dusk, and the shape of the park leaves much of it hidden from street view. Increased police patrols will likely help curb some of the illegal activity at the park, while increased use by other residents would also greatly help the park as well.

French Lane Park

This park is located on the right-of-way of the old MO 51 route. The new MO 51 now runs adjacent to the park on its west side. East of the park, across French Lane, is mostly residential property. MO 51 represents one of the two major arterial streets through the City, and the park is located one mile from Interstate 55. This puts French Lane Park in

an interesting position. On the one hand, its high-profile location on an arterial road makes it ideal for a prominent, unique facility similar to a community park; on the other hand, the nearby residential property, smaller size, and current lack of significant development suggest use as a neighborhood park.

The park is being classified as a neighborhood park in this plan because of its current use. At this time, there is only a single pavilion on the site, along with the City's two water towers (one scheduled for removal). As the park's best use begins to become clearer in the coming years, it is possible that it will move to a different classification.

Northdale Park

Northdale Park is, for the most part, a park in name only. The park serves as a stormwater detention basin for the surrounding area, and as such is frequently flooded with a foot or more of water, and even more frequently is wet, soggy, and muddy. There are no amenities left in the park except for a small wooden bridge and a broken trail. Not surprisingly, only a single respondent to the recent Parks & Recreation survey indicated they had used the park in the past year.



There is little land in the park that is out of the floodplain. Significant investment would have to be made to develop the park to a point where any new amenities would be above water. Consider the additional fact that most of the park's 10 minute walk service area is shared with Viola Blechle Park and School Street Park and it quickly becomes clear that Northdale Park is of very low priority for the City.

School Street Park

By far the smallest park in the entire Parks & Recreation system, School Street Park still sees a significant amount of use by the neighboring children. The park is surrounded entirely by residences and is located less than 500 feet from Viola Blechle Park, as-the-crow-flies. Currently, the only amenities in the park are a merry-go-round and two swing sets, which are located in close proximity to the house to the south.

Viola Blechle Park

As the largest of the 5 neighborhood parks, Viola Blechle Park sports just over 8 acres of space for play and recreation. The most prominent feature in the park is the new playground which was installed in 2015. This new playground represents the future for most all playgrounds in the City's parks; any new playgrounds recommended in this plan envision the type of playground at Viola Blechle as the baseline example.



The park also has a basketball court, backstop, and will soon have a new pavilion thanks to the public school's Building and Trades program. The park is also home to a cave opening in its southern section.




Figure 4.6: French Lane Park Existing Facilities




Figure 4.8: Northdale Park Existing Facilities




Figure 4.9: Northdale Park Service Area




Figure 4.10: School Street Park Existing Facilities





Figure 4.12: Viola Blechle Park Existing Facilities

4.2.2 Community Parks

There are three community parks in the City: The Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex, City Park, and the Perry Park Center. These three facilities offer a wide range of recreational opportunities to Perryville, including: soccer, baseball, and softball fields, trails, disc golf, an indoor pool, playgrounds, theater, and racquetball court. For a city the size of Perryville to offer facilities of this scope is outstanding. The City far exceeds the national recommendation on acres of community parks per 1,000 people and should be commended for offering such a wide assortment of recreational opportunities to its residents.

The Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex

Developed through a generous donation by the Optimists Club, The Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex boasts 10 soccer fields, a ¼ mile walking trail, concession stand, pavilion, playgrounds, and restrooms. The complex is used heavily by the general public, high school soccer team, the Perryville Optimists Soccer League, and for tournaments throughout the year. Field availability and turf health are becoming problematic due to this heavy use.

City Park

The City Park is the largest City owned park and offers numerous opportunities for recreation. The park offers 8 baseball/softball fields, 2 T-ball fields, a football field with up-rights, a soccer field, community garden, an 18 hole disc golf course, over 1.25 miles of hiking/biking trails, multiple playgrounds, batting cage, sand volleyball courts, basketball courts, and tennis courts.

There are areas of the park that have not yet been developed; however, the presence of sinkholes in these areas precludes any placement of significant amenities. As such, City Park is quickly reaching a point where the addition of any large amenity will require the removal of an existing feature.

Perry Park Center

The Perry Park Center serves as an excellent example of City/County collaboration. The building is a County owned facility, which the City maintains. Construction of the Park Center was funded by a county-wide sales tax, while operations and maintenance of the

facility is funded jointly by the City and County. The facility was opened in May of 1999 and has been enjoyed by thousands of visitors since.

Few communities the size of Perryville can boast such an impressive facility. Recreational opportunities include a gymnasium, racquetball court, theater, indoor pool, weight room, cardio room, indoor track, and the public library. During peak use times there is insufficient capacity in the gymnasium and there is a clear need for classroom space.

The indoor pool environmental equipment has exceeded its expected service life thanks to skillful maintenance, but is now frequently down for maintenance. Even when operating, the Dectron is no longer able to properly dehumidify the space nor maintain a consistent temperature in the water.




Figure 4.15: Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex Walking Proximity





Figure 4.16: City Park - Existing Facilities

Figure 4.17: City Park Walking Proximity





Figure 4.18: Perry Park Center Walking Proximity

There are two natural resource areas located in the City, though neither are owned nor operated by the City. Both parks provide Perryville residents an excellent opportunity for more nature related recreation.

Legion Lake

Legion Lake is a County owned and operated park that offers an approximately 9 acre lake for fishing and large areas of green space for active or passive recreation. The park also includes a volleyball court and a few pavilions, and benches. The park is surrounded by residential and agricultural land uses and abuts the southern portion of the 9-hole Perryville Country Club. The park is located near significant tracts of open agricultural lands to the east.

Perry County Community Lake

Owned and operated by the Missouri Department of Conservation, Perry County Community Lake offers a nearly 90 acre lake with fishing and a boat ramp, nearly three miles of hiking trails, archery, and a private campground nearby. The park is surrounded mostly by agricultural and forestry land uses, with some residential uses as well.





Figure 4.21: Perry County Community Lake



4.3 Surveys of Community Needs

Two community surveys were recently completed which provide insight into the community's thoughts on the Parks & Recreation system. The first was a survey conducted by ETC Institute in the Fall of 2015 which was mailed to every residence in the City. This survey addressed all facets of the services and facilities offered and operated by the City, not just Parks & Recreation. The survey received approximately 690 respondents. Of the 37 questions in the survey, 8 questions dealt directly with the Parks & Recreation system or had a Parks & Recreation component to them. The summary of these questions can be found in Appendix 7.7.

The first question of the survey asked about satisfaction with city services. Parks & Recreation came in second only to Fire Service, with 85% of respondents Satisfied or Very Satisfied, and only 5% Dissatisfied. The percent Satisfied or Very Satisfied remained the same as in 2010. Residents were also asked to rate their satisfaction with 29 individual parks and amenities. Of these, only one item, Northdale Park, received a Dissatisfied rating by more than 20% of respondents, with 38% stating they were Dissatisfied with the park.

Respondents were also asked to select any number of amenities they would like to see added in the future. Additional bathrooms and a splash pad were tied for number one, with 37% of respondents. A water feature was next with 34%, and additional hike/bike trails and an amphitheater were tied for 4th, with 30% of respondents each desiring such an amenity. Rounding out the top 10 were: upgrading existing playgrounds (29%), more pavilions (26%), paved parking lots (25%), dog park (24%), toddler play area in the Perry Park Center (22%), and instructional programs (22%).

The second survey, conducted by the SEMO RPC, was focused only on the Parks & Recreation system and was open from November, 2015 to February, 2016. This survey was open to anyone wishing to participate, regardless of where they live. The survey was conducted online and was publicized through the City's website, social media, email blasts, radio interviews, and newspaper articles. Over 435 individuals participated in the survey.

Of the over 400 respondents, 71% indicated they used parks or recreational facilities at least more than once a month in the past year, while the remaining 29% indicated they used the parks or facilities only once a month or less. When asked to rate the parks and recreation opportunities, 80% rated them as Good to Excellent, while only 1% said they were Poor, 18% rated the opportunities as Fair, while 1% had no opinion. This indicates, as with the ETC survey, that residents are very happy with the overall quality of the City's parks, facilities, and programs.

Respondents were also asked which facilities they use most, with the top three being the Perry Park Center (85%), the City Park (80%), and The Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex (61%). After these three, there is a sharp decline, as is expected, down to the neighborhood parks. Viola Blechle is by far the most used neighborhood park, with 20% of respondents indicating they use the park. This is more than triple the rate for the next facility (Perry County Museum) and more than 5 times the rate of the next neighborhood park (School Street Park).

Viola Blechle Park has approximately 1/8 of the City's population in its service area, yet 1/5 of respondents indicate they have used the park. This is due primarily to the recent renovations to the park, including a new playground. No other neighborhood park had over 4% of respondents citing use. Renovations to these other neighborhood parks would greatly increase their attractiveness and service to the public.

Survey participants were asked to name the single most important issue for them concerning the Parks & Recreation system in Perryville. This was an open question, allowing respondents to answer with an entire paragraph if desired. As expected, answers varied, but some trends did emerge. General topics cited, with the approximate frequency, included:

- Maintenance (34)
- Programs and activities (27)
- Outdoor water recreation (20)
- Safety (15)
- Trails (12)
- Updating equipment (10)
- Lighting in parks (10)
- Additional/new indoor facilities (9)
- Parking (9)
- Dog park (7)

It is important to note that this question did not ask about the quality of the issue, only the importance of the issue.

Respondents were asked to pick all of the facilities, from a provided list, that are important to them and their family. The facilities with at least 50% of respondents indicating importance were:

- Pavilions 91%
- Trails 88%
- Picnic Areas 86%
- Indoor Pool 79%
- Outdoor Pool 79%

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- Splash Pad 79%
- Natural Areas 77%
- Multi-Purpose Rooms 71%
- Soccer Fields 67%
- Fishing Access 60%
- Baseball Fields 54%
- Basketball Courts 52%

Respondents were also asked to pick all of the programs, from a provided list, that are important to them and their family. The programs with at least 50% of respondents indicating importance were:

- Lifetime Fitness Programs 85%
- Swimming & Aquatics 82%
- Movies in the Park 81%
- Indoor Recreation 82%
- Youth Sports 78%
- Music in the Park 61%
- Visual/Performing Arts 61%
- Creative Arts 59%
- Outdoor Adventure 57%
- Adult Sports 51%

Finally, respondents were asked to specify what facilities they would like to see added to the park system in the future. This was another open question, though responses were easier to group. There were two clear favorites, outdoor water recreation with 27 mentions, and new or additional indoor facilities with 20 mentions. Next was trails with 12 mentions and a skating rink was the 4th most mentioned facility, at 9 mentions.

The results of these surveys were used to help determine the recommended actions found in Chapter 6, and in developing the goals and objectives in Chapter 3. The complete results can be found in the Appendix.

5 Park Definitions & Development Standards

5.1 Overview

Park types, facilities standards, and location criteria help the City with park planning, acquisition, and development, and to strengthen communication between the various entities that are concerned with the future of the parks system.

The City of Perryville has chosen to utilize the following standards as the basis for development and location criteria, in addition to local knowledge and experience. Characteristics specific to Perryville that were factors in these standards included: geography; proximity to other parklands managed by other jurisdictions; demographics; and economic feasibility.

This chapter defines the types of parks in Perryville, both current and proposed, including: neighborhood parks, community parks, natural resource areas, and greenways. The purpose, location criteria, size, service area and population benchmarks, typical facilities and features, and representative parks are given for each park type. Each section concludes with comments regarding future planning and development of that type of park within the City system.

5.2 Neighborhood Parks

1. Purpose

- Neighborhood parks are the basic unit of the park system and serve as the recreational and social focus of the neighborhood. Focus is on providing informal, active, and reflective recreational options for all ages.
- Unique site character helps create a sense of place for the neighborhood.

2. Location Criteria

- Typically within a 10 minute walk (approximately $\frac{1}{4}$ mile) that is uninterrupted by non-residential roads or other physical barriers.
- Interconnected to trails/sidewalks/low-volume streets.
- High visibility to surrounding streets for public safety.

3. Size Criteria

- 5 acres is considered minimum size. 5-10 acres is optimal.
- Demographic profiles and population density within the park's service area are the primary determinants of size.
- Existing City Average: 4.4 acres.
- Recommendation: From 3-5 acres in low-density neighborhoods with appropriate terrain and dimensions; from 5-10 acres in medium to high-density neighborhoods or where terrain or dimensions are not ideal.

4. Service Area and Population Benchmarks
 - Common national standard is between 1 and 3 acres per 1,000 population.
 - Existing City Average: 2.7 acres per 1,000 population.
 - Recommendation: 2.0 acres per 1,000 population.
5. Facilities and Features
 - Physical capability for both passive and active recreation.
 - Active recreational features may include:
 - Playground
 - Paved court
 - Unstructured open play areas
 - Low impact recreation options (e.g. horseshoes)
 - Passive recreational features may include:
 - Trails
 - Picnic/sitting areas
 - Public art
 - Conservation of natural features
 - Historic and cultural sites
 - Security lighting.
 - Bike racks.
 - Off-street parking for parks over 3 acres.
6. Representative Sites
 - Viola Blechle Park
 - Feltz Street Park
7. Comments
 - School Street Park is significantly smaller than other neighborhood parks and provides limited amenities.
 - Northdale Park is effectively a retention basin for the surrounding area and floods periodically; no longer has any amenities.
 - French Lane Park offers a very high profile area located on MO 51, just a short distance from I-55.

5.3 Community Parks

1. Purpose
 - Community parks focus on meeting community-wide recreation and gathering needs.
2. Location Criteria
 - Served by arterial and collector streets and trail networks.
 - Proximity to other Community Parks and facilities over-lap considered.
3. Size Criteria
 - As needed to accommodate desired uses.

- Demographic profiles and population density within the park’s service area are the primary determinants of size.
 - Usually 30 acres or more.
 - Existing City Average: 62.4 acres.
 - Recommendation: A minimum of 30 acres in most cases; 50+ acres is preferred.
4. Service Area and Population Benchmarks
- Common national standard is between 5 and 8 acres per 1,000 population.
 - Existing City Average: 15 acres per 1,000 population.
 - Recommendation: 10 acres per 1,000 population.
5. Facilities and Features
- Physical capability for both passive and active recreation.
 - Informal and programmed active recreation facilities, which may include:
 - Playground
 - Paved court
 - Unstructured open play areas
 - Low impact recreation options (e.g. horseshoes)
 - Swimming pool
 - Baseball/softball/soccer fields
 - Volleyball courts
 - Disc golf
 - Climbing wall
 - Skate park
 - Passive recreational features may include:
 - Trails
 - Picnic/sitting areas, some reservable
 - General open space
 - Ornamental gardens
 - Amphitheater
 - Public art
 - Conservation of natural features
 - Historic and cultural sites
 - Security lighting.
 - Bike racks.
 - Off-street parking.
6. Representative Sites
- City Park
 - Perry Park Center
 - Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex

7. Comments

- Although an indoor facility, the Perry Park Center is considered a community park, though size benchmarks do not apply.
- Although the Soccer Complex is near the minimum recommended acreage, its specialization mitigates concern about its size relative to this standard.

5.4 Natural Resource Areas

1. Purpose

- Lands set aside for preservation of significant natural resources, open space, and visual aesthetics.

2. Location Criteria

- Resource quality is of primary concern. Should exhibit unique landscapes of the region.
- Diversity and balance of natural areas, including wetlands, hillsides, forestland, meadows, floodplain, and water bodies.
- Natural areas that contain multiple ecosystems (i.e. water body, wetland, hillside), enabling the protection of a wider variety of wildlife.

3. Size Criteria

- Highly variable.
- Typically large areas so as to accommodate the location criteria above, but not required.
- Sufficient size to protect resources.

4. Service Area and Population Benchmarks

- Variable based on location and resources.

5. Facilities and Features

- Functioning ecosystem
- Wetlands
- Water bodies
- Forests
- Caves
- Other geologic features
- Protection of rare, threatened, or endangered species
- Wildlife habitat
- Interpretive exhibits
- Trails
- Historic and cultural sites

6. Representative Sites

- Perry County Community Lake
- Legion Lake

7. Comments

- While both existing parks are located within the City, it does not own or operate either of them.

5.5 Greenways

1. Purpose
 - Effectively tie park system components together to form a continuous park environment.
 - Allow for uninterrupted and safe pedestrian movement between parks throughout the community.
 - Protect water quality.
 - Preserve functional wildlife corridors through the city and between larger public and private natural areas.
2. Location Criteria
 - Along natural features, such as: rivers, streams, ridgelines, and wetland boundaries.
 - Along man-made features, such as: railroad beds, power line right-of-way, and streets right-of-way.
 - Prioritized near schools, senior living, and community centers.
3. Size Criteria
 - Varies across nation, from 25 ft. wide in high-density areas to over 200 ft. wide.
 - Recommended:
 - 60 ft. wide for greenways along man-made features
 - Minimum 100 ft. in width on either side of waterway for water quality protection.
 - Optimum width of 330+ ft. on either side of waterway to protect wildlife.
4. Service Area and Population Benchmarks
 - Not applicable.
5. Facilities and Features
 - Natural corridors most desirable.
 - Well-designed corridors linking residential neighborhoods with schools and other public places.
 - Trails for walking, jogging, biking, skating, horseback riding.
 - Public access to water bodies.
 - Water trails for canoeing.
 - Historic and cultural sites.
 - Access control to adjoining properties when necessary.
6. Representative Sites
 - None currently in the City.
7. Comments

- No greenways currently exist in the City. See Section 6: Action Recommendations for additional information.

6 Action Recommendations

6.1 Overview

The following chapter discusses the recommended actions for the City to take over the next 20 years to address the needs and desires expressed by the community in the context of the existing system. Not all of the following recommendations will be accomplished in the next 20 years; some recommendations will be altered or even deleted during plan updates, while new recommendations will be added to address emerging needs.

It should also be stressed that many of the recommended actions are fluid, and in some cases dependent on other actions. For instance, an expansion to the Perry Park Center is recommended in future years but the extent of such an expansion is dependent partly on whether the City chooses to develop a second indoor facility elsewhere in town. Also, while there are multiple illustrations in this section depicting conceptual ideas for the development of many of the parks, they are intended solely as illustrative examples and not as definitive site plans.

6.2 Future of the Park System

6.2.1 Unique Character

Each park should be given a strong and distinct sense of character and place. This can largely be accomplished by developing a unique feature within each park that highlights or compliments the natural, social, and/or cultural setting of the site. Examples include, but are not limited to:

- Boardwalk
- Mounds
- Splash pad
- Unique versions of common amenities (e.g. slides built into a hill rather than as free standing structures)
- Boulders
- Outdoor Pool
- Terrace
- Labyrinth
- Art/sculptures
- Gardens
- Gazebo
- Conservation areas
- Cave entrances
- Water features

- Trails

The following photos provide examples of some of these features. These examples are descriptive only, not prescriptive; they are intended to provide an idea of what could be included, not what should be included.

Finally, shade trees plantings in areas of various parks could help improve the aesthetics and usability of many of the park spaces, such as the proposed dog park area in the City Park, portions of French Lane Park, Viola Blechle Park, School Street Park, and possibly areas of The Bank of Missouri Soccer Park so long as the growth of the trees will not disturb the field surface or irrigation systems.

The Missouri Department of Conservation offers the Tree Resource Improvement and Maintenance (TRIM) Grant program to assist with the management, improvement, or conservation of trees on public lands. The City may also wish to pursue Tree City USA certification in the future. See the appendix for additional information on these two MDC programs.

6.2.2 Neighborhood Parks

Additional neighborhood parks will be needed in the future as the City continues to develop. Likely areas of growth will be in the northwest, northeast, and/or southeast areas of, and around, the City. Depending on the intensity and concentration of future development, new neighborhood parks may be needed in 5-10 years. The city should begin targeting areas suitable for parks in each growth area utilizing the standards in this plan. The City should also be prepared to work with developers to implement land set-asides.

Most of the City's neighborhood parks have their amenities scattered about the site. Instead, amenities should be clustered together to add a stronger sense of place to the parks and increase aesthetic appeal. Additionally, renovations to playgrounds in each existing neighborhood park should include not only play structures but also benches, trash receptacles, and lights. When feasible, restrooms and/or water fountains should be included as well.

Chamber of Commerce Park (Feltz Street) Recommendations (Figure 6.1: Chamber of Commerce Park (Feltz Street) Proposed Changes and Additions):

A new, large playground with a walking trail (up to 1/3 of a mile) throughout the entire site, with constant views to the playground. This will leave a large open space for free-play and the development of a unique feature such as mounds or exposed boulders for children to play on. A pavilion should be installed near the playground and skate park. The unused maintenance shed should be removed, and the restrooms should be renovated and put back into service. Finally, the trail should connect to Kiefner Street via the drainage swale to the east.




Figure 6.2: French Lane Park Development Concept 1

French Lane Park (Figure 6.2: French Lane Park Development Concept 1 & Figure 6.3: French Lane Park Development Concept 2):

The high profile location makes the park ideal for additional functions beyond a neighborhood park, though a modern playground near the existing pavilion is

recommended. This site is also a possible location for a large splash pad which could be integrated into terraces down the site to utilize the natural topography and give it a distinct character. Another option is to develop a plaza with a fountain, benches, and pavilion or gazebo. The park should also be considered a future nodal park along the proposed greenway and a trail through the site should be developed.

Another consideration is the site is large enough to accommodate a substantial building (30,000 square feet or more) and the attending parking needs. The site has also previously been considered for the location of a military history museum and office space, along with a military themed park. As with all the development concepts in this plan, these two figures are merely intended to illustrate potential uses for this site and generate discussion, not to imply a precise design for the site.

Northdale Park (Figure 6.4: Northdale Park Removal Effect):

The simplest solutions include either removing the site from the park system and maintaining only as a part of the stormwater system, or continuing to maintain the site as-is, though with little to no use by the community. The park currently serves only a small area of residential development south of US 61. Improved access into Viola Blechle Park on the north and/or east sides would increase its service area, mitigating the fact that Northdale Park currently provides no true service to its neighborhood. Figure 6.4: Northdale Park Removal Effect illustrates in red hatching the areas that would technically lose 10 minute-walk service if Northdale Park were removed from the park system.

Either of these options would still leave the City the opportunity to develop the site in the future if necessary or desired. Initial development could include earth work to build up an area on the perimeter out of the floodplain for a small playground and a trail system built outside the floodplain. Later, a boardwalk system or other unique feature such as a conservation area could be developed to provide a distinct sense of place for the park. This additional investment into Northdale Park would be of low priority compared to other needs in the park system, but would remain an option as long as the City retains control of the site.





Figure 6.5: School Street Proposed Changes and Additions

School Street Park (Figure 6.5: School Street Proposed Changes and Additions):

Existing play equipment should be removed and replaced with a modern playground similar to Viola Blechle Park's. A pavilion should be installed as well, while the slope on the north side of the park could be used to create a system of "play terraces" to offer additional, low cost play amenities.

Viola Blechle:

Trail access from the north and/or east should be acquired to vastly improve the park's service area. Additionally, the park should be connected directly via sidewalk/trail to The Bank of Missouri Soccer Park, School Street Park, and possibly Northdale Park in the

future. Also, a significant internal trail system (up to a half of a mile) could be developed given the size of the park.

There is also the opportunity for the City's cave system to be highlighted. Improvements to the existing cave could provide an opportunity for users to enter into the cave a short distance and would provide a unique asset for the site. Alternatively, a faux-entrance could be constructed to provide the impression of entering a cave while preserving the existing entrance. The City could also pursue collaboration with other organizations such as MDC, MoDNR, Missouri Cave and Karst Conservancy, and the National Speleological Society on interpretive signage and exhibits.

Finally, given park's proximity to The Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex, the generally unused baseball field in the park may better serve the community if converted into a soccer field.

Former Hoeckele's Site (Figure 6.6: Hoeckele Lot Proposed Use):

The City currently leases the former Hoeckele's site, located on the northwest corner of the N. Jackson Street/W. St. Joseph Street intersection. This property is located next to Eagle Bank and across the street from the County Courthouse. This lot would make an excellent location for a plaza with a bandstand/pavilion, tables and benches, and a fountain. This site could also accommodate at least a small restroom if determined to be desired by the public.

Figure 6.1: Chamber of Commerce Park (Feltz Street) Proposed Changes and Additions

6.2.3 Community Parks

Addition of lighting on remaining unlit fields would increase available field-hours by nearly double for each type of field. Additional fields may still be needed in the future, however. As-is, City Park and the Soccer Park have no room for additional fields without removing other amenities or acquiring adjacent properties. The City should consider targeting properties for either expansion of existing parks or entirely new facilities at some point in the future.

The Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex:

The Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex has reached capacity on two fronts. First, there are not enough field-hours available to conveniently accommodate all of the games and practices that are being held in the City. Much of the soccer season runs during the school year, meaning that many games and practices must be run after school and completed before dusk. The addition of lighting on each field would significantly increase the number of available field-hours and allow games and practices to be scheduled well after sunset.

The second capacity issue is one related to maintenance. Ideally, a number of fields would be taken out of service each year to allow the turf to recuperate. This is not currently feasible as all 10 fields are needed all season long. Additional fields will be necessary to allow for the service-rotation of fields each year. Therefore, additional land acquisition is recommended in the future, preferably on the east side of Hwy 51. Trail connections should be made to the expansion, including a pedestrian bridge if fields are located across Hwy 51. Bringing BBL Field and Kueker Field to the same grade would also help aid in grass retention and maintenance by allowing the fields to be rotated.

Additionally, all 10 fields are in need of new goal frames and netting, and all goals should conform to the divisional sizes for each field. New backstop netting is also needed, and should be augmented with a chain link fence as the base of the backstop to prevent damage from mowers and trimmers.

Finally, lights along the entire hiking/biking trail in the park should be installed. Assuming typical bollard-style lights, alternating sides of the trail every 40 feet, approximately 100 light fixtures would be needed to adequately light the trail. This estimate will vary though, depending on multiple variables, including style and height of fixture, lamp intensity, etc.

City Park:

City Park has the most recommended actions of any park in the system. However, given its size, number of features offered, and number of residents served, this is not surprising. Some recommendations are relatively minor, such as screening the maintenance facility to improve the aesthetics of the park or improving wayfinding through the park with improved signage.

There is an opportunity to create a quadplex of baseball/softball fields rotating field #9 and swapping the soccer field with baseball field #10. This would help make better use of the existing restrooms and concession stand at fields #2 and #3, and would help with wayfinding and traffic flow as well. Field lighting should be installed on all remaining unlit fields to increase the number of field-hours, thereby reducing the current strain on capacity during peak times. Additionally, all fields that have not recently had their surfaces and backstops renovated should be scheduled for such in the coming years. A new batting cage is also needed, as the current cage is over 20 years old and is wearing out quickly. Finally, a road connection from Ballpark Court (Fields 2 & 3) to Huber Road utilizing the existing parking lot off of Huber Rd. should be constructed to improve traffic flow and wayfinding, especially during tournaments.

It is also recommended that a dog park be located where the community garden currently sits. This is an ideal area as it has no residential properties nearby, reducing possible complaints about noise or nuisance. The community garden should then be relocated south of State Street near the neighborhood that abuts the park.

Many of the streets in City Park are in need of resurfacing, and a re-alignment of State Street is recommended. As State Street currently enters the park it moves between baseball field #8 to the north and the parking lot and restrooms to the south. This creates a dangerous situation for people, especially children, as they must cross the street frequently. It is recommended that State Street be re-aligned south of the parking lot and nearby pavilion and that the restrooms be relocated north of the new alignment, nearer to the pavilion. Additionally, a new playground should be installed on the hilltop near the T-ball parking lot. This playground could be substantial in size, similar to Melaina's Magical Playland in the city of Cape Girardeau in Cape Girardeau County Park-North.

Lighting along the entire trail system in the City Park should be installed to provide a safe hiking/biking environment for all users. Assuming typical bollard-style lights, alternating sides of the trail every 40 feet, approximately 175 light fixtures would be needed to adequately light the trail. This estimate will vary though, depending on multiple variables, including style and height of fixture, lamp intensity, etc.

The existing maintenance facility currently located in the heart of the park could be relocated to a peripheral site in the future. This would open up the currently occupied ground for additional recreational uses and would bring this prominent location back into use for park-goers. It is still recommended that the existing facility be screened until it can be relocated.

Finally, an outdoor splash pad should be installed somewhere in the City, most likely in City Park. The area near the pool and Park Center offers some of the best opportunities, though not the only ones. As with many of the other recommendations in this plan, the

size and type of pad could vary from a simple paved area with a few fountains to a complex facility with numerous amenities. The pad should be designed to allow expansion over time as demands and funding increase.

Park Center:

One of the most pressing issues for the Perry Park Center, and for the Parks & Recreation system as a whole, is the maintenance and rehabilitation of the indoor pool facility. The upgrade of the swimming pool's Dectron system (dehumidifier and primary heat source) has reached critical importance. The current system is no longer able to keep the pool at a constant temperature, dehumidify the air, or operate on a consistent basis. According to facility consultants, the Dectron was under-sized relative to the size of pool it was to service but skilled maintenance has allowed the City to use it well beyond its typical life-expectancy. The general consensus among City staff and third-party consultants is that the Dectron could fail at literally any moment. The replacement of this equipment is critical if the City intends to continue providing indoor pool services to its residents.

Additionally, the decking around the pool, locker rooms, and other pool-related items are in need of rehabilitation or replacement. See section 7.1 of the Appendix for a summary report of maintenance needs for the pool, based on a review of the facility conducted by the CTS Group.

A small splash pad could be located inside with the pool by replacing the kiddie pool or Club Med area, while a larger outdoor facility could be developed near the Park Center. Additionally, the kiddie pool could be replaced with a warmer therapy pool if desired by enough users.

New Indoor Facilities:

Additional classroom and gym space is currently needed, with additional indoor facilities being one of the most requested features in the Parks & Recreation survey. Partnership(s) with schools and/or other organizations could help relieve some cost burden for the City, either by negating the need to build additional facilities or by sharing in cost of constructing a new facility. These new facilities could be handled in multiple ways, including additions to the Park Center, building entirely new facilities, or a combination of both.

An expansion of the Park Center is one possible solution, the size and type of which being dependent on multiple considerations, including financing and community input. The new addition could be a small annex with additional classroom space only, up to a new gymnasium complex with multiple classrooms, weight rooms, etc. Larger expansions to the Park Center will require the relocation of surrounding parking lots and possibly other amenities. An expansion of the existing Park Center would help reduce

strain on park staff compared to a new facility elsewhere in the City, and little to no property would need to be acquired, further reducing costs for the City.

If an entirely new facility is desired to serve other areas of the City, there are multiple areas such a facility could be located, depending on development patterns of the City, land availability, and funding sources/third-party assistance. The new facility could range from a simple, inexpensive gymnasium with a few classrooms up to a large facility with multiple gyms, aquatic complex, and soccer and/or baseball field complexes depending again on development patterns of the City, land availability, funding sources, and also the extent of development/additions to the Park Center.



Figure 6.7: City Park Proposed Changes and Additions




6.2.4 Natural Resource Areas

Neither of the two existing natural resource areas in the City are owned or operated by the City. As such, recommendations for these facilities are limited in this plan. The most significant recommendation is to develop strong partnerships with both the County and Missouri Department of Conservation. This could allow for joint programs and activities at the parks while also giving the City an opportunity to be involved in the development of the parks.

The area south of Harvest Court and Legion Lake, along Cinque Hommes Creek, represents an excellent opportunity for a new natural resource area. This area could offer numerous activities, such as an equestrian area, hiking, biking, and camping. This area could also tie directly into Legion Lake to create an extensive natural area and could also connect to the proposed greenway, seen in the next section.

Though not in the City, Ball Mill Resurgence, as mentioned in Chapter 2, also serves as a natural resource area and could be tied to any interpretive exhibits on Karts formations that the City may implement. As with Legion Lake and Perry County Community Lake, partnering with the L-A-D Foundation in some form could prove beneficial to both the City and the Foundation.

Figure 6.8: Possible Natural Area




6.2.5 Greenways

Greenways represent an opportunity for the City to preserve key natural corridors while connecting much of the City together with recreational trails. Figure 6.9: Potential Greenway and Trail Routes, shows the extensive greenway system that has been identified in and around the City, which includes large portions of Dry Run Branch, Cinque Hommes Creek, Highway 51, Sycamore Rd., and the future Route AC. Additional recreation trails is a high-ranking item in the Parks & Recreation survey, and this proposed greenway system would provide a total of 15 miles of trails, with approximately 8 miles in the inner loop.

This greenway system would run directly through French Lane Park, allowing it to serve as a nodal park along the greenway and serve as a prominent, convenient access point to the system. There are other potential nodal parks along the greenway as well. The Sycamore Rd area offers excellent opportunities for a nodal park and will need a park in the future as the area develops. Also, there are opportunities along and north of US 61, an area which is not currently served by any parks today. The greenway network also runs through the proposed natural resource area south of the City and could easily be connected to Legion Lake via trails as well.

While Figure 6.9 shows a general proposed phasing of the greenway, it should be understood that the greenway network will likely develop in pieces overtime, and that many of the initial pieces will not connect and may be scattered throughout the system. However, with patience and persistence, the greenway system can be completed and could serve as one of the City's most used and cherished parks.

6.2.6 Maintenance

In the Parks & Recreation survey, maintenance was the most frequently cited item when respondents were asked what the single most important issue is for them concerning the Parks & Recreation system. It should be noted that this identification does not necessarily indicate that maintenance is a problem, only that it is of high value to residents. In fact, during the 2015 community survey, only 5% of respondents were unhappy with the quality of the parks and facilities.

Given the importance of maintenance to residents, it should be a high priority for the City. Since any addition to the Parks & Recreation system, be it new park land, facilities, or programs, will add to the maintenance burden on the City, both short-term and long-term fiscal impacts should be considered for any new project.

To assist the City with this, it is recommended that major projects have a life-time cost summary developed with cost estimates for both the implementation and the maintenance of the project. This summary should also include targeted sources of funds for the implementation of the project and for at least 20 years of maintenance. When considering the availability of future funds, the City should apply a "reasonably expected" test to the funds with a simple question: is it reasonable to expect the City will have access to the cited revenue? If so, the funds are a viable source for the maintenance of the project. If not, then other sources should be investigated. This life-time cost summary will help City staff and leaders make informed decisions by considering the full, long-term costs of any project.

As previously mentioned, and shown in detail in Appendix 7.1, there is nearly \$2 million worth of repairs and maintenance needed immediately for the Perry Park Center Pool. This maintenance must be a priority for the City if it wishes to continue offering indoor pool services. At the time of writing, the City is already making efforts to program funds into upcoming budget-years to begin addressing these issues. However, system needs still far exceed current resources.

Finally, an additional maintenance facility, similar in size to the existing facility at City Park, should be considered for The Bank of Missouri Soccer Complex. This would allow maintenance staff to be more efficient by locating critical supplies and equipment in two locations, reducing travel time and wear on equipment.

6.2.7 Community Involvement

Community involvement through other organizations and agencies can help reduce the strain on the City of maintaining and expanding the parks system. Potential partners include:

Perry County – improvements to Legion Lake Park.

Public and Private Schools – Shared classroom spaces, financial help in new facility construction and/or leasing of space once constructed.

Residents, Optimists, Knights of Columbus, Churches, Banks and other businesses – Volunteers for maintenance, Park Clean-up Days and other events, tree plantings, and park adoption.

Athletic Leagues – Maintenance, donations/assistance with development of facilities and programs.

6.2.8 Funding

The City's Parks & Recreation budget is typically around \$2 million annually. Given the community's expressed concerns about maintenance of facilities and the desire for additional amenities and programs, the City will have to find additional sources of funding for the Parks & Recreation system to be able to meet the expectations and desires of the people.

Some possible sources of funding for the Parks & Recreation system include, but are not limited to:

- Sales Tax
- Community Improvement District - A political subdivision that may be formed within the City or County, which can impose a sales and/or property tax on itself. Revenue from these taxes can only be spent on projects within the Districts boundary.
- System Development Charges - A fee charged to a developer for new construction or developments; can be used to fund development of parks or other city services.
- User Fees - Fees charged on a per-user-basis (e.g. Park Center memberships or single-use passes)
- Grants
- Not-for-Profits
- Donations

7.2 American Kennel Club Suggested Dog Park Guidelines

The following guidelines are taken from the American Kennel Club's *Establishing a Dog Park in Your Community* publication.

Design Guidelines

- One acre or more of land surrounded by a four- to six-foot high chain-link fence. Preferably, the fence should be equipped with a double-gated entry to keep dogs from escaping and to facilitate wheelchair access.
- Cleaning supplies, including covered garbage cans, waste bags, and pooperscooper stations.
- Shade and water for both dogs and owners, along with benches and tables.
- A safe, accessible location with adequate drainage and a grassy area that is mowed routinely.
- If space allows, it is preferable to provide separate areas for small and large dogs. This will enable large dog owners to allow their pets to run more freely, while protecting smaller dogs that may not be suited to the enthusiastic play of larger breeds.
- Signs that specify park hours and rules.
- Parking close to the site.

Rules and Regulations Guidelines

- Owners are legally responsible for their dogs and any injuries caused by them.
- Puppies and dogs must be properly licensed, inoculated, and healthy.
- Animals should wear a collar and ID tags at all times.
- Owners must clean up after their dogs.
- Dogs showing aggression toward people or other animals will be removed from the park. Animals who exhibit a history of aggressive behavior will not be permitted to enter.
- Puppies using the park must be at least four months old.
- Owners should not leave their dogs unattended or allowed out of sight. If young children are permitted in the dog park, they too should be under constant supervision.
- Dogs in heat will not be allowed inside the park.
- Owners must carry a leash at all times. Dogs should be leashed before entering and prior to leaving the park.
- Violators will be subject to removal from the park and suspension of park privileges.

7.3 Tree Resource Improvement and Maintenance (TRIM) Grant

TRIM is a competitive, cost-share tree care program administered by the Missouri Department of Conservation in cooperation with the Missouri Community Forest Council. The program provides reimbursement of \$1,000 to \$10,000 to assist government agencies, public schools, and nonprofit groups with the management, improvement, or conservation of trees on public lands. Dependent on budget approval, we may be able to offer up to three \$25,000-maximum grants, with collection of data and management-plan creation as the priorities.

Projects eligible for TRIM funding include tree inventory, removal or pruning of hazardous trees, tree planting, and training of volunteers and city/county employees to best care for our community forests.

Applicants must submit a completed application form, which details project costs and funding sources, maps and drawings of the project site, a three-year maintenance plan for the project, and a letter of approval from the governmental body owning the proposed project site. The application deadline is currently June 5.

Projects for funding are selected on a competitive basis. A panel of judges assesses each proposal for its value to the community, thoroughness as a tree-management program and the ability to promote, improve and develop a community's urban forest, and economic feasibility.

Grant recipients can receive up to 60 percent of the money needed for their projects. Projects located in communities with The Arbor Day Foundation's Tree City USA designation are eligible for an additional 10 percent in matching funds.

7.4 Tree City USA

Every community, regardless of size, can benefit from caring for their publicly owned trees and achieving Tree City USA certification. To be certified, a town or city must meet four standards established by The National Arbor Day Foundation and the National Association of State Foresters.

These standards were established to ensure that every qualifying community would have a viable tree-management plan and program. It is important to note that they were also designed so that no community would be excluded because of size.

The Four Tree City USA Standards

1. A tree board or department
2. A tree-care ordinance
3. A community forestry program with an annual budget of at least \$2 per capita
4. An Arbor Day observance and proclamation



Q1 What is your age?



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

Q3 What is your gender?



Q4 Overall, how would you rate the parks and recreation opportunities in Perryville?



Q5 How often have you or members of your household visited parks or used recreation facilities in Perryville in the past year?



Q6 Which park facilities do you use?









Q19 In which area of the City do you live?





Q1 What is your age?



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



Q4 Overall, how would you rate the parks and recreation opportunities in Perryville?



Q5 How often have you or members of your household visited parks or used recreation facilities in Perryville in the past year?



Q6 Which park facilities do you use?





Q18 How many years have you lived in Perryville?



Q19 In which area of the City do you live?





Q1. Satisfaction with Major Categories of Services Provided by the City of Perryville


by percentage of respondents who rated the item as a 1 to 5 on a 5-point scale (excluding "don't know")


by percentage of respondents who rated the item as a 4 or 5 on a 5-point scale (excluding don't knows)

TRENDS: Satisfaction with Public Safety Services 2010 vs. 2015



Q5. Satisfaction With Parks and Recreation Services


by percentage of respondents who rated the item as a 1 to 5 on a 5-point scale (excluding "don't know")


by percentage of respondents who rated the item as a 4 or 5 on a 5-point scale (excluding don't knows)





by percentage of respondents



Q8. Park System Amenities That Residents Would Most Like the City to Add in the future


by percentage of respondents (multiple responses allowed)
